### Chair Notes and Departmental Update

It is hard to believe that we are now in a new semester. Exciting things continue to happen in your Department of Legal Studies. I will share briefly several of the current department projects. The Department continues to welcome a flow of outstanding students into the criminal justice and paralegal majors. As of the first of January, about three hundred-seventy majors are seeking our undergraduate degrees. As most of you know, our offices are temporarily located in Barr Hall. We expect to return in 2007 to Odom Hall once the extensive renovations of that building are complete. I recently visited Odom and was amazed at the progress the contractors have made in the renovation of that historic building.

On the faculty side, all faculty are extremely involved both in and out of the classroom. **Dr. Stephen Mallory** has worked as the project director in the development of the degree proposal for the **Master of Criminal Justice** program which will soon be submitted for University and IHL approval. It is our

hope that the degree will be approved and the first graduate class will be offered Fall of 2007.

On the curriculum side, in addition to the development of an impressive series of graduate courses for the **Master of Criminal Justice**, the faculty of the Department is in the process of developing a new course which will be entitled CJ 399 **SOCIAL JUSTICE AND COMMUNITY SERVICE**. This is a service-learning course designed to provide the student with a transformational experience through an exploration of the student's personal and social awareness. It will provide the student with an opportunity to get involved in his/her community in a tangible way by integrating community service with classroom learning in order to gain an enhanced perspective concerning civic responsibilities and social practices. We will be one of the first programs in the nation to offer such a course.

On the instructional side, we have submitted our proposed summer and fall schedules, which is now available on the web.

Our Paralegal Program continues to grow under the direction of Professor Angie Williams. With a student enrollment in the BSPS of about seventy students and about forty enrolled in the Paralegal Certificate, it is clearly the most outstanding program of its type in the Southeast.

Our Legal Studies Student Association is co-sponsoring the First Legal Studies Career Day to be conducted in Johnson Commons on April 13, 2006, the Second Annual Department of Legal Studies Awards/Honors Banquet on May 5, 2006 also at the Johnson Commons Ballroom and the Legal Studies Department again is cosponsoring the School of Applied Sciences – Lott Leadership Institute Social Justice Conference from 28 – 30 June 2006. **Dr. Chester Quarles** has agreed to coordinate the Banquet and I have no doubt that it will be even better than last year. We would like to have as many alumni and practitioners as possible in attendance.

The Guest of Honor will be **Sheriff F. D. “Buddy” East** of Lafayette County. Sheriff East has served in law enforcement for forty years, as a deputy sheriff in Lafayette County, on the Oxford Police Department where he served as Assistant Chief of Police and has served as Lafayette County Sheriff since his first election to the office in 1972. He is clearly a law enforcement legend in Mississippi and it is our honor that he will be our guest at this years banquet.

We expect another exciting year in the Ole Miss Legal Studies Department!

### The Training Corner & The Justice Institute (Chief Corban)

The Justice Institute continues to work closely with local, state and federal criminal justice agencies in the delivery of outstanding quality criminal justice training and short session academic courses. During the Spring 2006 semester, the Department will present over fifteen weekend courses. Topics ranging from Law Enforcement Operations to Serial Offender case studies and numerous training sessions to include Critical Incident Stress Training (December 6 - 7, 2005), Undercover Operations (January 11 - 12, 2006), Hate

to Bias Crime (January 24 – 27, 2006) and Canine TCAP Certification (February 21 – 23, 2006).

The Justice Institute is currently working on three grants in the areas of Homeland Security, domestic crimes and violence against women. We are excited about the opportunities these grants will potentially provide.

Our second class from the Lafayette County Law Enforcement Officers Academy has an enrollment of over twenty students. The Academy class includes officers from the Mississippi State Guard, Lafayette, Pontotoc and Yalobusha Counties, Byhalia and Oxford Police Department. Instructional staff are drawn from the United States Marshal's Service, Mississippi Bureau of Investigation, National Center for Justice and the Rule of Law, Department of Justice, Lafayette County Sheriff's Department, Oxford Police Department and the faculty at Ole Miss. The class President is Teresa LeSure, of the Byhalia Police Department.

They will complete their 200 class hours of instruction with class graduation scheduled for May 13, 2006. This will certainly be a great class and we are proud of their success.

## **Notes from Southaven, Tupelo and the WEB (Mr. Jeff Johnson)**

The Department's program growth on the Tupelo, Southaven and Booneville Campuses and on the WEB continues to impress all.

The enrollment and enthusiasm at the Outreach campuses are increasing. Two years ago, classes at Southaven, Tupelo and Booneville had an average of 4 courses that were being scheduled and cancelled due to low enrollment. In short, if the classes were not offered through Distance Learning from Oxford, there was a good chance that the class would not make.

Today, we are offering an average of 6 classes at each campus, all of them making on their own without the Distance Learning component. We offer not only the traditional one night a week course, but we offer classes on-line, weekend format and 8 week format as well. It is my intention to accommodate class schedules to the needs of the students.

We are also working with the local law enforcement agencies, having recently co-hosted with Southaven Police Department a Federal Law Enforcement Training Center (FLETC) train the trainer program, "Hate and Bias Crimes." Thirty one police officers from Mississippi, Kentucky, Tennessee and Alabama attended the event. Currently we are in negotiations with FLETC to host future training opportunities. ## New Faculty Appointments

In January, three new members were added to the Legal Studies Faculty. Two of the new faculty members were appointed to the Department to serve as WEB-Based faculty and one member was appointed to serve on the Oxford Campus. The three new members of the faculty are **Dr. Ronald Tannehill, Dr. Greg Etter and Professor Danny Hall.**

**Dr. Tannehill** has joined us from the faculty at Washburn University, where he was a Professor of Criminal Justice and served as the first Director of the Master of Criminal Justice degree program. Under his leadership, the Washburn University Master of Criminal Justice program grew to a student enrollment of about seventy five graduate students. Without question, under his direction, it was the premier graduate degree in Criminal Justice in Kansas.

## PROFESSIONAL PROFILE

This is a new addition to our Newsletter. In this section we will profile outstanding practitioners and former faculty who have significantly contributed to the success of the Legal Studies Department.

We would like to start this series in our newsletter with a profile of a true supporter of this program **Dr. Columbus B. Hopper**. Most of us who have graduated from the law enforcement program enjoyed several classes with Dr. Hopper.

Dr. Hopper was born in North Carolina. After service in the United States Army, where he excelled in baseball, he attended Gardner-Webb College, received his Bachelor of Arts from Furman University, a Master of Arts from the University of North Carolina – Chapel Hill, and a PhD from Florida State University.

Dr. Hopper first joined first joined the faculty at Ole Miss 1957. After a few years at Ole Miss, Dr. Hopper left

Mississippi and explored the country returning to the University of Mississippi in 1965. From 1965 until his retirement in 1994, he touched the lives of every law enforcement major.

The author of countless manuscripts and professional papers, few of his students will forget his book *Sex in Prison*, detailing conjugal visitation in Parchman or his articles such as *Murder, Southern Style* or *Skin Flicks and Soap Operas*.

As a Professor of Sociology, he instructed such classes as Penology and Deviant Behavior. As a member of the University's graduate faculty, he served on the majority of Master of Criminal Justice degree committees.

## Class Profile

This is a new section in our newsletter. In each edition, we will profile one of the classes offered in the program. Our goal is to share some of the exciting things that are occurring in the Department. In this edition of the Newsletter, we would like to profile **CJ 155, Tactical Operations**. **CJ 155, Tactical Operations** is an outstanding course that exposes the student to current issues impacting law enforcement operations. Limited to Legal Studies Majors with a 2.5 grade point average, the course is presented by a team of instructors who deliver the course in both the classroom and “field” environment.

Students receive instruction on topic to include ethic behavior, the use of force, law enforcement operational planning and procedure, lethal and non-lethal weapons and their usage and the impact of stress upon the criminal justice professional.



Additionally, in this course, students receive instruction on the professional usage and care of firearms. Conducted off campus at the F.D. “Buddy” East Law Enforcement Training Center in Lafayette County, the students are instructed on the
