Course contents: Keyboard theory and technique, sight reading, harmonization, improvisation, ensemble playing, solo repertoire, sequencing, score reading.

Learning objectives: Achieve intermediate level keyboard proficiency and develop overall musicianship through study and performance of representative repertoire from the four major musical periods. Build strong foundation of musical concepts and pedagogical skills applicable to music education careers.

Materials: Each student is required to have a textbook, staff paper, pencil, and a three ring binder.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Roll is checked every day. Students will be allowed **5 (five) absences** before their final grade will begin to drop. Absences for illness, Choir or Band tours, NATS, etc., are included in these five absences. For every class missed after the fifth absence, your final grade will drop a whole letter grade. Any student who accumulates 9 (nine) absences or more will receive an “F” for their final grade.

Tardy Policy: Be on time to class—tardies are checked daily. **3 (three) tardies equal one absence.** If you are more than 15 (fifteen) minutes late to class, you will be counted as absent.

GRADES: Each student is assessed using the following grading scale:

A grade of C or higher is required on all music courses applied toward the degree.

The final grade for the course will be determined using the following percentages:

HOMEWORK AND QUIZZES — 15%

Homework and practice assignments will be given each class period. Quizzes will be both announced and unannounced, and will test materials which have been prepared since the last quiz or exam. A maximum of 3 (three) announced quizzes

may be made up. Each make-up quiz must be taken at the next regular class session or a grade of “0” will be recorded. It is the student’s responsibility to ask the teacher to give a make-up quiz.

EXAMS — 85%

There will be 4 (four) major tests this semester. The test schedule and percentage value/test is:

- Exam 1 - 20%, Friday, September 18
- Exam 2 - 20%, Friday, October 9
- Exam 3 - 20%, Monday, November 2
- Exam 4 - 25%, Friday, December 4

If a test is missed for any reason, a grade of “0” will be recorded. Students may make up ONE missed test on Thursday, November 19th or November 20th.
