Race and Ethnicity in the Modern South

Location: University of Mississippi
Dates: June 17-23, 2012
Lead Scholar: Ted Ownby, Director of the Center for the Study of Southern Culture, University of Mississippi

This seminar will concentrate on the South since the 1970s, asking about change in the South through urbanization and suburbanization, economic change, new migrations of Hispanic, southeast Asian, and other groups, responses to the Civil Rights Movement, and other developments.

Applications must be submitted online.

In 2012, the Gilder Lehrman Institute will offer forty seminars for more than 1,000 educators. Led by eminent historians, these seminars are held at institutions throughout the United States and United Kingdom, and they provide resources and strategies to take back to the classroom.

Educators K-12 and National Park Service interpreters are eligible. Seminars are limited to thirty participants by competitive application.

Public school teachers are awarded a full fellowship, which includes room and board, books, and a reimbursement of up to \$400 to offset travel costs. Teachers may also commute.

Independent school teachers are eligible for fellowships up to 50 percent of the total fees.

Recent graduates of education programs at the undergraduate and graduate level who plan to pursue careers in history education K-12 are eligible to apply for seminars as **New Teacher Fellows**. Applicants must complete an education degree in either Fall 2011 or Spring 2012.

Graduate credit is available.
