Lower Division Requirements for a Bachelor of Arts Degree

1. English (12 hours)

Acceptable courses are:

Composition (6 hours): ENGL 101, LIBA 102, ENGL 102

Literature (6 hours): any English 200-level literature course (ENGL 221-226)

2. Foreign Language (6 hours at the 200-level or above)

Students must complete 6 hours at the sophomore (200) level or above in one language.

Students may choose from Chinese, French, German, ancient Greek, Italian, Japanese, Latin, Portuguese, Russian, or Spanish.

Students entering the University with fewer than 2 years of high school French or Spanish must enroll in French or Spanish 101. Students with 2 or more years of high school French or Spanish must enroll in French or Spanish 121 or above.

There is a 12-hour intensive language sequence for French, German and Spanish →111 and 211. Admission to this course sequence is by departmental permission only.

Students may not fulfill the lower-division foreign language requirement with courses taken through Independent Study, except for ancient Greek and Latin.

3. History (6 hours)

Any history course will satisfy this requirement, but the History Department strongly recommends HIS 101 and 102.

Freshman students may not register for 300-level or above courses; Students must have departmental permission for a history research seminar to fulfill this requirement.

4. Humanities (3 hours)

Acceptable courses are:

any African American Studies course

any Classics (CLC) course

Gender Studies 103, 201, 333, 311, 390

any Philosophy or Religion course

Southern Studies 101, 102

Honors 101, 102

5. Fine Arts (3 hours)

Studio and workshop courses cannot be used to satisfy this requirement.

Acceptable courses are:

any Art History (ARHI) course. Art Department recommends ARHI 281 or 286.

Music 101, 102, 103, 104, or 105. (MUS 101 is for majors/minors only.)

Theatre 201 or Dance 200

6. Mathematics (3 hours)

Acceptable courses are:

MATH 110, 115, 121, 123, 125, 261, 262, 267, 268

7. Natural Science (9-11 hours)

Two courses must be the same area of science and the third course must be in a different area of science.

Two of the science courses must have a lab.

The areas of natural science are:

astronomy OR physics OR physical science

biology

chemistry

geology

Note that the student who chooses 2 courses from the Department of Physics and Astronomy must take 2 courses in astronomy or 2 courses in physics or 2 courses in physical science. In this case, the third science course must not be in the Department of Physics and Astronomy.

8. Social Science (6 hours)

Acceptable courses are:

any Anthropology course

any Economics course

Journalism 101

any Political Science course

any Psychology course

any Sociology course
